- 5) Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation
- 6) Mental Health Consultation with Providers working with At-Risk Youth
- 7) Older Adult Behavioral Health Screening & Response
- 8) Early Intervention and Recovery for Young People with Early Onset
- 9) Transitional Age Youth Multi-Service Center
- 10) Peer Outreach & Training
- 11) Trauma and Recovery
- 12) Crisis Response Team

### **San Francisco County Plan Strengths:**

- The PEI Planning Process built upon existing relationships with eighteen agencies with deep roots in diverse communities. These agencies formed the building blocks for outreach to underserved, unserved and inappropriately served communities.
- San Francisco used an impressive amount of professionally researched data that was distilled into a user-friendly format and discussed in community meetings. This data was instrumental in arriving at services priorities.
- The Holistic Wellness Project is transformational and should be used as an example in other counties and other states. It is based on the Holistic System of Care for Native-Americans, a model including community outreach and education, pro-social community building events, direct services, and service linkages. It will target three distinct cultural communities in San Francisco.
- The Early Onset Project has an appropriate emphasis on broad training for the community.
- The TAY Multi-Service Project is a community-based center that provides a range of holistic TAY-specific programs and services such as employment training, academic support, youth development and leadership, behavioral health care, and health promotion.

- The Peer Outreach & Training Project provides consumer-run education about mental illness that reduces stigma and focuses on recovery.
- The Crisis Response Team provides immediate crisis care and case management services to families and loved ones of victims of gun violence and homicides. This team works closely with the Community Response Network, a group of neighborhood-based providers that coordinate services and resources to address gang violence and families of victims of violence.
